Legislative Report

SCA 5 (Hancock - D) Local Government Finance

Summary

1. SCA 5 would exempt from taxation for each taxpayer an amount up to \$500,000 of tangible personal property used for business purposes. SCA 5 would prohibit the Legislature from lowering this exemption amount or from changing its application, but would authorize it to be increased consistent with the authority described above. This measure would provide that this provision shall become operative on January 1, 2019.

Background

- 2. SCA 5 is designed to overhaul portions of Proposition 13 (1978) and specific property tax protections on commercial property.
- 3. The California Constitution provides that all property is taxable, unless exempted by the California Constitution or by federal law.
- 4. The California Constitution authorizes the Legislature to classify personal property for differential taxation or for exemption by means of a statute approved by a 2/3 vote of the membership of each house.
- 5. SCA 5 for owners of commercial and industrial property subject to reassessment, who also operate a business or businesses on that property, where the increase in assessed value as a result of this measure exceeds 25% compared to the assessed value of the property prior to the operation of this measure, would exempt that portion of the assessed value that exceeds 25% as so described from taxation for a period of 5 years if specified conditions are met.
- 6. The California Constitution generally limits ad valorem taxes on real property to 1% of the full cash value of that property. For purposes of this limitation, "full cash value" is defined as the assessor's valuation of real property as shown on the 1975-76 tax bill under "full cash value" or, thereafter, the appraised value of that real property when purchased, newly constructed, or a change in ownership has occurred.
- 7. This measure, commencing on the lien date for the 2018-19 fiscal year, would require the full cash value of commercial and industrial property, as defined, to be the fair market value of that property as of the lien date.
- 8. This measure, for the 2018-19 fiscal year, would require only 50% of those properties that have not been reassessed at fair market value, as specified, to be assessed at fair market value, and by the 2019-20 fiscal year would require all other properties that have not been brought to fair market value to be assessed at fair market value.
- 9. This measure would require owners of property subject to reassessment as so described to pay only a portion, as provided, of any increase in property tax due in the first year and second years after initial reassessment to fair market value.
- 10. The California Chamber of Commerce has labeled SCA 5 a "job killer" piece of legislation.
- 11. SCA 5 is currently pending a hearing.
- 12. A similar issue with similar language is currently being circulated for a ballot measure in 2016.

Arguments in Support

13. Authors of SCA 5 state, "the proposal is targeted at the largest corporations and property owners, many of whom have avoided reassessment in the nearly four decades since voters passed Proposition 13, sometimes by taking advantage of loopholes in the law. Homeowners and agricultural properties are exempted from SCA 5, which also includes a tax break for small businesses.

Arguments in Opposition

14. The California Business Roundtable cites and argues a 2012 study by Pepperdine University found that a tax increase similar to SCA 5 would result in \$71.8 billion in reduced economic output and cost 396,345 jobs over the first five years. And those

impacts would grow over time. There is simply no reason to weaken our economy and kill jobs with SCA 5 at a time when California has a record budget surplus.

2016 Ballot Measures

The following is a list of statewide measures that have qualified for the ballot. An eligible initiative measure is one in which the required number of signatures have been submitted to and verified by the county elections officials. Eligible initiative measures will become qualified for the ballot on the 131st day prior to the next Statewide General Election unless withdrawn by the proponents prior to its qualification by the Secretary of State. In future Legislative Reports, full summary and background will be provided.

June 2016 Statewide Ballot Measures

1. SCA 17 (Resolution Chapter 127, Statutes of 2014), Steinberg. Members of the Legislature: suspension.

Summary

This ballot measure would specify when suspending a Member of either house of the Legislature, a motion or resolution to that effect shall be adopted by a vote of the majority of the membership of the house. Prohibits a suspended Member from exercising any rights, privileges, duties, or powers of his or her office, or any resources of the Legislature, while under suspension. Requires that same vote to remove the suspension. Authorizes the forfeiture of salary and benefits as well.

November 2016 Statewide Ballot Measures

2. Referendum to Overturn Ban on Single-Use Plastic Bags.

Summary

Current law prohibits grocery and certain other retail stores from providing single-use bags but permits sale of recycled paper bags and reusable bags. This ballot measure would over turn current law (SB 270) which was passed last legislative session, and would overturn the ban on single-use plastic bags.

3. SB 1174 (Chapter 753, Statutes of 2014), Lara. English language education.

Summary

This ballot measure amends and repeals provisions of Proposition 227 (1998). Deletes the sheltered English immersion and waiver provisions. Provides school districts and county offices of education shall provide English learners with a structured English immersion program. Authorizes parents and legal guardians to choose a program that best suits their child. Requires parent and community input in establishing language acquisition programs. Deletes provisions regarding liability for fees and actual damages for non-implementation.

4. State Fees on Hospitals. Federal Medi-Cal Matching Funds.

Summary

Increases required vote to two-thirds for the Legislature to amend a certain existing law that imposes fees on hospitals (for purpose of obtaining federal Medi-Cal matching funds) and that directs those fees and federal matching funds to hospital-provided Medi-Cal health care services, to uncompensated care provided by hospitals to uninsured patients, and to children's health coverage. Eliminates law's ending date. Declares that law's fee proceeds shall not be considered revenues for purposes of applying state spending limit or determining required education funding. Summary of estimate by Legislative Analyst and Director of Finance of fiscal impact on state and local government: State savings from increased revenues that offset state costs for children's health coverage of around \$500 million beginning in 2016-17 (half-year savings) to over \$1 billion annually by 2019-20, likely growing between 5 percent to 10 percent annually thereafter. Increased revenues to support state and local public hospitals of around \$90 million beginning in 2016-17 (half-year) to \$250 million annually by 2019-20, likely growing between 5 percent to 10 percent annually thereafter.

Other Potential Statewide Ballot Measures Pending Approval

Over 30 proposed ballot measures are in various stages of the initiative process which includes signature gathering, eligible summary and title and signature approval by local county registrars and the Secretary of State. Topics of potential statewide ballot measures include but are not limited to: statewide minimum wage increase; several medical marijuana and legalization of marijuana initiatives; park fees; spousal support; and neighborhood legislatures. In future Legislative Reports full summary and background will be provide as each qualifies for the statewide ballot in 2016.
