The 2015 – 2016 legislative session currently has over 100 bills that have already been introduced. Most legislative proposals (bills) are awaiting committee assignments. The following bills have been identified as potential business related bills. 2015-16 Legislative Calendar

Legislative Report

SB 4 (Lara – D) Health Care coverage: Immigration Status

Summary

1. SB 4 states the intent of the Legislature that all State residents who are eligible for Medi-Cal, a qualified health plan offered through the State Health Benefits Exchange, or affordable employer-based health coverage, enroll in that coverage and obtain the care that they need.

Background

- 2. SB 4 is currently in the beginning of the legislative process and only declares certain intents of the Legislature such as all state residents, regardless of immigration status, have access to affordable health coverage and care.
- 3. SB 4 aims to expand coverage under Medi-Cal (California's Medicare) to income-eligible residents whether documented or not.
- 4. It would also set up a marketplace that would "mirror" Covered California, the state's health care exchange under the Affordable Care Act. The ACA, or "Obamacare," specifically excludes undocumented people from coverage.
- 5. SB 4 was introduced December 1, 2014 and is currently resides in the Senate Rules Committee pending action.

Arguments in Support

6. According to the author, "Access to health care is a human rights issue and until everyone is included, our work is unfinished. I look forward to working with a broad coalition of immigrant, health care and legislative advocates to achieve the goal of health for all in the coming year."

Arguments in Opposition

7. Opposition to a similar legislative proposal introduced last year by the author (SB 1005, 2014) stated that any proposed expansion of the Medicaid program would require the executive board governing the California Health Benefit exchange to provide the same subsidies and cost-sharing reductions extended to eligible individuals to the estimated 2.3 million untaxed, illegal and/or undocumented entities within Californian jurisdiction...would increase an immense burden on California taxpayers.

SB 8 (Hertzberg - D) Taxation

Summary

1. SB 8 states legislative findings regarding the Upward Mobility Act, key provisions of which would expand the application of the Sales and Use Tax Law by imposing a tax on specified services, would enhance the state's business climate and would incentivize entrepreneurship and business investment by evaluating the Corporate Tax Law, and would examine the impacts of lower and simpler Personal Income Tax Law.

Background

- 2. The Sales and Use Tax Law imposes a tax on retailers measured by the gross receipts from the sale of tangible personal property sold at retail in this state, or on the storage, use, or other consumption in this state of tangible personal property purchased from a retailer for storage, use, or other consumption in this state.
- 3. The Personal Income Tax Law imposes taxes on personal taxable income at specified rates, and the Corporation Tax Law imposes taxes upon, or measured by, corporate income.
- 4. SB 8, if passed, would take effect in 2019 and would replace the current temporary tax increase as passed by voters in 2012 (Proposition 30).
- 5. SB 8 was introduced December 1, 2014 and is currently resides in the Senate Rules Committee pending action.

Arguments in Support

- 6. The author argues in support that SB 8 would make three broad changes to the tax code:
 - a. Broaden the tax base by imposing a sales tax on services to increase revenues. Local jurisdictions would not be authorized to increase sales tax on services, as they now can do with the sales tax on goods. Though the new revenues would be collected by the state, the ownership of those funds allocated to local government under this measure will be controlled by local government using traditional allocation mechanisms. Health care services and education services would be exempted from the tax, and very small businesses with under \$100,000 gross sales would be exempted from the sales tax on services.
 - b. Enhance the state's business climate and incentivize entrepreneurship and business creation by evaluating the corporate income tax to determine whether it is meeting its intended purposes, including whether it is born equitably among California's businesses and what impact it has on the business climate, while at the same time linking changes to a more reasonable minimum wage.
 - c. Examine the impacts of lowering and simplifying the Personal Income Tax while maintaining progressivity. The measure's goal is to reduce the income tax rates imposed under the Personal Income Tax for low-and middle-class-income households so that families earning \$100,000 pay only \$1,000. The income tax rate for top earners may also be reduced in a manner that balances fairness with mitigating adverse impact to both state revenues and competitiveness. The obligation of top earners with regard to other tax obligations for top earners, including Proposition 63, would remain intact.

Arguments in Opposition

7.	Opponents argue that current law, Proposition 30, is a temporary \$7 billion tax program and SB 8 would be a permanent sales
	and use tax program that would take effect after Proposition 30 sunsets.

<u>State Assembly District 22 – Assembly Member Kevin Mullin – D</u>


